Dear Sir:

I have been interested in the letters appearing in recent issues of BNA TOPICS on the late use of pre-confederation cancellations.

Mr. Lussey's note (Dec., p. 188) of "Quebec Feb. 22, '81" is quite a late use at a large town. In small villages, however, where doubtless renewal of material was not often necessary, there were stray survivals of the old postmarks to a considerably later date. From the Province of Quebec alone I happen to have the following: St. Ephrem d'Upton C. E., No. 2, '93 North Stukeley C. E., Oc. 7, '95

Ascot Corner C. E., Mr. 9, '99
This last one is a very clear strike

on Scott #68, on cover.

Wheatland, C. E., Oc. 30, '95

While on the subject of "Survivals," no doubt many BNAPSers are aware of the use of the old serif-letter type of the 1840-80 period at Bridgetown, N. S., till after the turn of the century. My specimen is dated My. 13, 1904.



The early abbreviation "C. B." in Cape Breton Island, also, did not entirely die out after Confederation. Mabou was still using this type in 1895.

BNAPS

The Philatelic Division of the Post Office, Ottawa, Canada, gives August 11th, 1948, as the date of issue for the new 5c postage due stamp. This is one for the first day collectors!

BNAPS

The inverted Canada Air Letter sheets, found recently by Mr. C. G. B. Stuart, Toronto, Canada, are being sold for \$10.00 each or three for \$25.00, although he was advised by a well-known BNA dealer to charge not less than \$25.00 each. If you are planning on buying this outstanding Canada postal stationery error now is the hour, as I understand there are only about 40 sheets left.

BNAPS

While on the subject of Canada Air Letter sheets, BNAPSer E. G. Lloyd writes to say that all 15c forms he has seen had the stamp, words, and lines printed in red, except a new supply which has the stamp printed in red, and the words and lines in blue.

RNAPS

Here is a call from Mr. A. K. Hurlburt, 1100 Balfour Road, Grosse Pointe Park, Detroit 30, Michigan, who specializes in V-Mail material and Airgraph letter sheets. The Airgraph service was in use from November 15, 1941 to July 14, 1945. At first the letter sheets were printed in black on white unfolded paper. This was changed to blue on white folded sheets in July, 1943. The first sheets issued were not numbered. The following issues were numbered 1 through 8 in the upper left corner. These come with the wording printed in English and French. Mr. Hurlburt is anxious to contact other collectors interested in Airgraphs. Drop him a line if you collect them, or perhaps even if you want to!



The Pence Postal Issues of Prince Edward Island

Threepence

The threepence value was first issued January 1, 1861. Listed below is a resume of the varieties:

- 3d blue November 18, 1861 to April 2, 1863 (Machine A P. 9)

- 3d blue September 14, 1864 to August 15, 1871 (Machine C P. 11½-12) dull blue light blue imperf. horizontally bisected diagonally with 3d for 4½d rate

 3d blue 1867 to August 1871 Compound (Machine BC)
 pale blue

Mr. Donald A. King makes note of a cover prepaid with a square of white paper stamped, 3d, which had been recognized as prepaying postage and had been cancelled. This provisional was in the specialized collection of Mr. B. Goodfellow who states "The square of white paper was part of the margin of the sheet and showed part of the gauge 9 perforation. It was pen-marked '3d NO STAMP."

Four Pence

Though presumed to have been received on the island as early as 1863 no earlier use of this value is reported other than March 3, 1870 by Goodfellow. Other experts have determined the stamp was placed in use January, 1869.

Possibly this is true as the rate to the United States of fourpence per single letter became effective November 1, 1868.

Portions of an outer frame line may be noted at a distance of 1 mm. from the design, similar to the variety noted for the 1d. (Lang)

*This does not show in the reprinted proof though the R is damaged in the plate but not making a perfect R.

Four & One-Half Pence

Engraved and printed by the American Bank Note Co. this stamp is undoubtedly the most beautiful of the Prince Edward Island issues. No plate varieties have been reported on this stamp.

First issued March 29, 1862 (Goodfellow) on a yellowish toned paper perforated 11. Listed below are the issued varieties:

Goodfellow stated a few specimens of the blue-lilac shade are known with Machine C perforations.

Portions of an outer frame line may be noted 1 mm. from the design. These occur infrequently as compared with the 1d and 4d, and in the later printings become more and more indistinct. (Lang)

Proofs and Essays

There are a great variety of plate proofs on thin paper including the threepence in dark blue and the fourpence in black. A die proof of the fourpence also exists in a solid square background in the color of the impression and in dark blue, brick red, brown red and black.

The proofs produced from the dies in the hands of the London Philatelic Society include the following: onepence, twopence, threepence and ninepence. They bore the inscription underneath "PROOFS FROM DIES OF STAMPS OF PENCE ISSUE."

Another die proof exists which bore the following inscription, "PROOFS FROM ORIGINAL ENGRAVED PLATE OF HEAD FOR PENCE ISSUE."

In addition there was also an engraving on brass similar to the threepence stamp although details in the background vary.

The 6d essay was from a plate made by the British American Bank Note Co. similar in design to the 4½d stamp. This was never introduced. Proofs are rare enough to substantiate the theory that but one proof sheet of each color exists.

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Trail of the Laribou

BNAPSer Bill Kemp, #85, writes. "I am in the process of transferring all my Newfoundland collection to a new album, and oh boy, what a job. I have been following Boggs' book for descriptions, etc., but of course it only goes to 1942. Can you give me any data on the following issues, the date of issue, and by whom they were printed—Scott's #253-266, 267, 268, 269, 270 and C19."

We certainly can Bill, and since we've been asked this question before, perhaps it is just as well that we print our reply in "Trail of the Caribou" for the edification of those members who might be interested in the same subject.

Scott's #253-266 were issued between 1941 and 1944, the first to appear being #256 which was recorded during October 1941, and the last was #266 which made its appearance in 1944. The stamps were engraved and printed by Perkins, Bacon & Co., for the contractors, John Dickinson & Co. They were printed on thin paper, watermarked Coat of Arms, in sheets of 100 (10x10), line perforated 121/2. Late December 1947, some of these stamps were issued with plate numbers. The plate numbers appear in each corner of each sheet of 100 stamps, thus making 4 numbers to the sheet.

Scott's #267 was issued January 2, 1943. It was printed by the Canadian Bank Note Co. of Ottawa, on unwatermarked paper, line perforated 12 in sheets of 200 (10x20) divided horizontally into two panes of 100 (10x10). Each pane has a wide gutter running vertically down the center between the 5th and 6th stamps thus dividing each pane into two blocks of 50 (5x10). The

plate number, #16367, is found in the left hand margin at the bottom of the lower pane. The imprint in caps is found in all four corners of the sheet of 200.

Scott's #268 was issued March 21, 1946. 1,000,000 copies of #267 were overprinted by D. K. Thistle-King's Printer. Panes were divided vertically into blocks of 50 (5x10) and top and bottom panes were used so that blocks of the surcharged stamp with plate number and the four imprints are available. No blocks with the gutter between are known as the setting of the surcharge consisted of 50 subjects. The stamps were withdrawn from sale at St. John's on April 1, 1946.

Scott's #269 was issued on April 21, 1947. It was printed by Perkins, Bacon & Co., for the contractors, John Dickinson & Co. It is printed on thin paper, watermarked Coat of Arms, in sheets of 100 (10x10), line perforated 12½. On March 23, 1948, the stamp was issued with plate number 43359, in each corner of the sheet of 100 stamps.

Scott's #270 was issued June 24, 1947, to commemorate the 450th Anniversary of the discovery of Newfoundland by John Cabot and the crew of the "Matthew." The central design is adapted from a painting by J. Dinsmore depicting John Cabot on the deck of his vessel gazing off at the shore of Newfoundland in the vicinity of Cape Bonavista. The original painting hangs at present in the House of Commons in London. The stamp was printed by Perkins, Bacon & Co., for the contractors, John Dickinson & Co. It is printed on thin paper, watermarked Coat of Arms in sheets of 100 (10x10), line perforated 121/2. On December 15, 1947, the stamp was issued with a plate number, #43476, in each corner of the sheet of 100 stamps. After being in use for a year the stamp was withdrawn from sale on June 23, 1948.

Scott's C19 was issued June 1, 1943. It was printed by the Canadian Bank Note Co. of Ottawa, on unwatermarked paper, line perforated 12, in sheets of 200 (10x20), divided horizontally into two panes of 100 (10x10). The plate rumber, #16479, is found in the left hand margin at the bottom of the lower pane. The imprint in caps is found in all four corners of the sheet of 200.

Congratulations to you our fellow-BNAPSers who were able to be among the few "great" who exhibited on opening night. Other outstanding exhibits were some from the collections of Mr. Edward Stern's Presidential Franks; Francis Cardinal Spellman's religious topics; P. Harbot Sanville's Britain's Penny Black; Mr. Bernard Davis of Philadelphia, who by the way is the man behind all these doings, with his postage dues on cover; Mr. Herman Rudenstein's Palestine and Israel. Among the BNAPSers present were Clarence W. Brazer, J. Alex Park, Donald Steele, Charles McDonough, James Culhane, Alf. Kessler, Bill Philler, Arthur Pierce, George Llewellyn, James Edwards and Paul Small.

Since then, Charlie McDonough was the guest of the Philadelphia Chapter of the APS where he was to show his prize winning collection of Canada. I

haven't heard how he made out but I'm sure he did O. K.

December 16th was the first "third Thursday of the month" meeting for the New York Group and a pleasant one it was too. The purpose of this meeting was to discuss and consider any items not listed in the Scott's Catalogue which could be sent them for considered inclusion in the Catalogue. The surprise feature of the meeting was the visit by member Gordon Harmer, auctioneer and publisher of the Scott's Catalogue. Understanding that Mr. Harmer was present only as a member of BNAPS, the members present refrained from putting Mr. Harmer "on the spot" but they managed to get in a few blows especially about the specialized catalogue on B. N. A. Speaking unofficially, Mr. Harmer explained that the Scotts Publications were pretty well caught up with their back log of printing albums, etc., and have not dismissed the idea of publishing such a catalogue as a future project. However, he emphasized the enormity of the undertaking and the immense amount of editorial work it would involve. Of course, he was assured the co-operation of BNAPS would be quite certain.

After Mr. Harmer called attention to the fact that the Scott's Catalogue was a general, it was not surprising to the members present to discover that most of the items submitted for discussion did fit into the specialized catalogue classification. However, Mr. Harmer explained that he recognized the potential possibilities this program of the New York Group portended and he was sure that Scott's Publication would recognize, appreciate and strongly consider any

items submitted for their consideration.

You BNAPSers, in and around (a wide around) New York, mark this date on your calendar—January 21st, 1949. The place—the Collectors Club, 22 East 35th St., N. Y. C. The reason—Winthrop S. Boggs, Director of the Philatelic Foundation and Secretary of its Expertizing Committee, will give an illustrated lecture with slides showing how the Committee examines stamps. He will also exhibit pages of unusual B. N. A. material. Isn't that some date!

If everyone took the attitude that "my one vote won't matter" no one would vote so that what could be hundreds of choices wouldn't be any. Don't ignore your ballot or lay it aside "till tomorrow." Mark it now, tomorrow never comes, and get it in that mail box right away. It's your choice, make it count.

EDITORIAL

BNA TOPICS—What else should I talk about? I certainly hear quite a lot about it—mostly good, and some not so good. For the good things said about it, let me publicly acknowledge my sincere appreciation to those responsible for any nice comments—the associate editors, authors and contributors of the fine standard of reading matter provided by them, reliable columnists, reporters and reviewers, and by no means the least, our faithful advertisers.

For some of the "not so good" comments, I take full blame—for some, I feel a better understanding and appreciation of the circumstances deciding their presence should soften their judgement. The Board of Governors studied and prepared a budget for the operation of the departments of our Society, determined and required in accordance with our income. A definite allowance was estimated for publishing BNA TOPICS, and it has been published within that allowance. Publication of BNA TOPICS is our greatest expense requiring the largest part of our income and receiving it. I too would like a \$150 issue but you can't have or get it for \$75. When our finances will permit a \$150 issue, we'll have it, I'm sure.

I've argued for a better TOPICS—coated paper, varnished cover, varied type faces, layout, etc., but I've been convinced by the counter-arguments that a "better" TOPICS doesn't only or necessarily mean "paper, type, etc." Better might mean "bigger," and to use the descriptive colloquialism, "more guts." As I said, I've recognized and accepted that wise interpretation and intend to comply with it by providing a larger BNA TOPICS—more pages. My intentions are dependant on your co-operation with contributions. Only then and in that way will we have a better BNA TOPICS.

The Bulletin of the Netherlands Study Circle is published by a group of more than 50 collectors in Britain who choose various topics for study and make periodic reports in their illustrated bulletin. A recent article lists over 50 current postal slogans of Canada. Another article notes over 70 Railway Post Offices in Canada, 1947-8. This latter listing will be continued in their next bulletin. Information can be obtained from Mr. Robert Gilmore, 142 Woodlands Road, Glasgow C3, Scotland.

The Essay Proof Journal, published quarterly by the Essay Proof Society, has a detailed illustrated article reviewing essays and proofs of various Canadian Revenues in their October issue, with current prices. This will be a great help to everyone. The article is a continuation from the July issue and will be extended in the December number. Further information regarding the Essay Proof Society may be secured from Mr. Clarence W. Brazer, 415 Lexington Ave., New York 17, N. Y.

The Regent Stamp Company of London, England, sent me a copy of their publication, The Regent Stamp Catalogue, Part 2. This section lists and prices all mint and used British Empire stamps issued between January 1931 through September 1948. A comparison of prices asked in England and those asked by Stanley Gibbons of New York proves very interesting. Generally, prices in England are slightly lower than here. One shilling equals 20c. The 4c Medallion brings 40c against \$1.10 here. More surprises—the 3c Medallion costs 20c as against 5c here; the New Brunswick gets 52c against 17c here. The Grain Elevator realizes 26 against 30c here; and so they go.

Weekly Philatelic Gossip carries almost every week, "The Canadian Roundtable," a column devoted to questions and answers on BNA material. In the December 4th issue, a collector discusses auction prices of various Canadian items and compares them to prices paid years ago. Mr. W. J. Scott concluded his series on Canadian plate numbers in the Novemter 6th issue. This article considered plate numbers and positions of Special Delivery, Airmail, and Special Delivery Airmails. Each plate number for the issue is noted, the number of stamps necessary to get the complete inscription, plus various other notes of interest. A comprehensive article on the Newfoundland 1920 Three Cent Provisional, by Charles Weinert, was also included in the November 6th issue of WPG.

In case you haven't heard, here is a choice bit of News from the November 13th WPG: a firm of London dealers have purchased a complete sheet of the imperf two cent 1898 Map stamp of Canada. It is offered complete at \$6000.00, or in blocks of four at \$328.00. Interested? A release in the November 6th Western Stamp Collector, stated that this sheet was found among the effects of the late Sir William Mulock, who designed the stamp when he was the Postmaster General of Canada. Previously the largest known piece was a block of four in the Worthington collection. Also in the Western Stamp Collector was an article written by F. Walter Pollock discussing the early use of Canadian stamps perfed O. H. M. S.

Cheer up! Here is the best news BNA collectors have heard in some time, the Holmes Catalogue is almost ready for distribution. The first 100 pages are off the presses and it looks as though the book will run over 300 pages. So you collectors that have been after Scott's Publications for a BNA Catalogue will

have your wishes fulfilled. This edition will include much information and will have to go some to top previous editions. So, there you are.

The December Bulletin of the Canadian Revenue Society is tops. It lists and illustrates the types of Excise stamps together with the explanation of the use for each type. You revenue collectors are missing something if you do not belong to this wide-a-wake Society. Contact R. DeL French, McGill University, Montreal, Que., Canada, the Society Secretary.

What's this? Fred Jarrett has released a price list of BNA stamps, the first such list in some years. Drop him a line at 30 Bloor St. W., Toronto 5, Ont. He would be glad to hear from you.

Here's news for you auction followers. Beginning next month, we plan to have a regular auction calendar listing coming auctions which will offer BNA material. This month, a large number of catalogues were received of past auctions (presstime) to be of much value. Also, some prices realized have been received, but the catalogues are missing. That's a heck of a fix! But, next month things will be different.

H. R. Harmer, Inc., 32 East 57th St., New York 22, N. Y., have compiled a very informative book on auction buying entitled, "How To Buy At Auction." A 3c stamp for return postage is the only obligation to receive a copy. Do yourself a favor and write for this very informative booklet.

One of the little things in the stamp hunt is that the very stamp you have searched for so long will turn up in the most obscure spot; the last place one would think of looking. Just the other day I received an auction catalogue from a west coast auction house listing a very nice copy of #7 & 10 (heavy cancel), Jubilees complete to the \$5.00, a superb mint block of the \$1 Parliament, a plate block of 8 of C2 mint (all those for Canada), plus a number of other BNA items. This auction is run by Munson Wallace, 208 East Broadway, Glendale 5. Calif.

Popular Stamps for December has a series of very interesting articles such as, "A Brief History of Papermaking"; a continuation of "Dinky Damus Varieties" listing various varieties submitted by readers; an article on the rare "Snuff Tax" stamp by Ronald Angus.

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An Unusual Province Designation

COULEE, WEST ASSA, is an odd designation for a place in AssInibola and I would like to know if anyone else has townmarks with this West (or maybe East) in it.

Assinibola was divided between Alberta and Saskatchewan about 1905, but in postal directories for some years before, many places were noted as being in Assa. West or Assa. East. This would indicate that at one time they planned on calling this division as named there, instead of adding part onto the adjoining territories.

In the 1895 Postal Guide there are three times as many offices in East as compared to West Assinibola, and Saskatchewan has very few listed. Adding this large group of EAST to the Saskatchewan list evened things in later years.

Athabaska, or Arthabaska, was a territory that just possibly might have a marking for it, but so far none have been heard of.

COULEE, illustrated, is not in the 1895 listing of postoffices but a townmark of 1900 is known, so it probably started about 1900.

A few months back, I made some comments on the "stop" appearing between "PRINCE" and "EDWARD" on the 3c stamp of Prince Edward Island. I have received a card from Frank Campbell with some remarks on this stamp and I believe that Mr. Campbell has the correct explanation for the regularity of the error, but we still are in the dark as to why the period in the first place. Mr. Campbell says. "that article in BNA TOPICS indicates that they were printed from two horizontal rows, stereotyped as many times as necessary. A check of the sheet would show it to be so, likely."

The Eleventh National Stamp Exhibition of SEPAD was held Nov. 15-20, 1948, in conjunction with the World Hobby Exhibition, at Convention Hall, Commercial Museum, Philadelphia, Pa. with an attendance of between 175,000 and 200,000.

BNAPSers with exhibits in the SE-PAD Show were Donald Steele, James T. Edwards and Charles McDonough of Philadelphia, and Tilghman K. Hausman of Pottstown, Pa., a recent member of B. N. A. P. S. Mr. Steele won a Trophy with his collection of 19th century U. S. proofs, covers and stamps. He also won a Blue Ribbon with his collection of the stamps of the Falkland Islands. Charles McDonough won a Silver Medal for his collection of Canada and Mr. Hauseman a Bronze Medal for his Canadians.

On Monday evening, November 29th, the Philadelphia Group of BNAPS had the pleasure of staging a B. N. A. Night for the Y. Stamp Club of Wilmington, Dela. BNAPSers who made the trip were James T. Culhane, who spoke on and exhibited the stamps of Newfoundland; Charles McDonough, Canada and Provinces; and Wilmer Rockett, Canadian Revenues. Alfred

Kessler was also a member of the party.

Dr. Walter W. Chadbourne introduced the visiting party and during the course of his remarks made an interesting talk on the aims and work of BNAPS.

The exhibitors say that the "Y" club members were one of the most attentive audiences they ever had the pleasure of addressing.

Looking over the catalogue of the Sisson's sale in early December my thoughts were arrested by lot #53, which reads, "I/ dull violet, forgery, with apparent genuine cancellation," (New Brunswick). Now, how does this happen? Is the whole thing faked, or did some forged stamps pass the postal authorities? The production of forged stamps to defraud the postoffice was quite an industry during the early use of adhesives, especially in the Italian states, and the number of covers passing through the post with forgeries testifies considerable success for the forgers.

Neither King nor Hooper make any mention in their writings of forgeries. In the Catalogue for Advanced Colectors, the New Brunswick section which appeared in April 1894, the following note on counterfeits is mentioned: "Recently some very fine counterfeits of the first issue have been placed on the market. The workmanship is so good that they will readily deceive anyone but an expert."

Beginning in the October number of the Philatelist, London, England, edited by Robson Lowe, BNAPS #L510, Mr. W. E. Durant Holiday begins a series of "Notes on the Postal History of Canada from 1760 to Confederation." These articles cover Upper and Lower Canada and the Maritime provinces, are exceedingly well written containing much "meat," and should not be overlooked by students of B. N. A. postal history.
