Dear Sir:

Received a copy of B. N. A. Topics of April vintage and I note you've made a very fine start for a new stamp magazine.

I write to you to help answer what someone's asked on inside back cover of Vol. 1, No. 2 for April 1944, on how to identify shades in colors of stamps. I thought every collector of British Colonials knew that. We do here, ie those of us who are fussy over gathering in every shade of a stamp within reason. The best color guide known is sold and sent out by Stanley Gibbons Ltd. of London, England and I think the price was half a Crown, ie 2/6 or 60c. I have friends who are so fussy that even this is not close enough and they make up their own color charts, ie using Stanley Gibbons' Chart as their guide. They

use cheap stamps and select in this way. They take a stamp say, cailed plain "red" which is called red in two or three well known catalogues such as Scott, Gibbons, and The Regent Catalogue (of London, Eng.) and use that as a start in reds and build up all the variations from it as say, carmine, scarlet, etc.

Where the catalogues named disagree on the color, shun the verdict on any one of them and wade in further and meet the color again in the catalogue and soon you'll find it where all two or three will agree. But its necessary to use catalogues which go in a lot for colors or color variations. By adopting this method a comprehensive color-chart can soon be made. It's the most accurate way to have a chart but personally, I find Gibbons' color chart good enough and I pride my collection as having more color variations than any known collection of British Empire Stamps That is my hobby, "Stamps of the British Empire," all except Indian States which give me a headache.

I hope I've given you something worth while, because I'm always ready to pass on any knowledge of stamps to one who is floundering. I am not a member of the B. N. A. Society as I have found more pleasure in the Empire stamps as above outlined. I am a member of the Ham. Phil. Society, The Ham. Stamp Club, The Can. Phil. 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AN INTERESTING VARIETY OF NEWFOUNDLAND #128 by Dan Meyerson

At the S. A. Brown sale of Newfoundland stamps held by Harmer-Rooke on December 19, 1940, an interesting and unlisted variety of Scott's #128 made its appearance.

This stamp was one of four provisionals issued late in 1920 because irregular direct steamer communication with England made it necessary to surcharge some stamps to take the place of the 2c and 3c stamps which had not arrived in time to take care of the existing shortage.

All of the provisionals were surcharged in panes of twenty-five (5 x 5), at the offices of the Royal Gazette in St. Johns.

The first of these stamps to be surcharged was the 15c Cabot. The surcharge consisted of the words THREE CENTS between two bars that were 10 ½ mm. apart, and 3000 stamps were so surcharged.

Boggs in his excellent book on Newfoundland says, "This setting was not satisfactory as the lower bar did not obliterate the figures '15' at the bottom of the stamp." Yet, when the S. A. Brown collection was sold there were two complete panes of twenty-five offered for sale. The first pane was the normal variety, but the second lot was described as a complete mint sheet of twenty-five showing variety in position of surcharge. The variety in question was that on this pane the surcharge was placed much lower and the lower bar did obliterate the figures '15" at the bottom of the stamp, but the upper figures were ther left unobliterated. This sheet was purchased from the collection by Stanle Gibbons, and I have a block of four from said sheet.

Do any of our readers know whether or not this sheet was unique, since I have never seen any other copies. It would be interesting to know if anyone has a copy used on cover during the time of issue,

Nominations and Elections of Officers

Excerpt from the By-laws are herewith published to acquaint the members with the procedure to be followed for nominations and elections of officers,

Minister added to Severy sensitives Eligibility and decrease to the super-Any member in good standing, except where a professional status has been declared when applying for membership, shall be eligible to the elective offices of the Society. A member in good standing, within the meaning of that term, is one who is not in default in the payment of dues or other indebtedness to the Society, and against whom no charges are pending.

Elective Offices

The elective offices of the Society shall be: a president, a vice-president, a treasurer, a secretary, and a hoard of governors of seven (7) members, none of whom shall hold any other elective office in the Society.

The elective officers of the Society shall be so elected by ballot in the odd numbered years, during the month of January.

Nominations may be filed with the Secretary by any five (5) members in good standing not later than ninety (90) days prior to the time and date of election. Each nomination so made shall be published in the official publication. BNA TOP CS, not less than sixty (60) days prior to the election date.

An official ballot shall be prepared by the secretary containing all nominations. *** No ballot other than the official form shall be valid. All ballots shall be returned to the Committee on Elections, which committee shall be appointed by the President at a time prior to the election. A plurality of all votes cast shall be required for the election of a candidate. If no one candidate shall rereive a plurality of the votes cast for such office, the Committee on Election shall provide for the issuance of new ballots for the election to that particular office. The EMCO listing of flown covers of Canada should do a lot to revive this type of collecting. But I have seen many of these covers in the past few years torn up. just to salvage the stamp, if in good condition. With aviation still in its infancy, these flight covers will have historic as well as philatelic value. When mounted they make a fine showing. Keep up the good work EMCO Journal.

Auction Commentary

The recent sale of superb British North America by Harmer Rooke and Co., on June 28, 1944, certainly brought the buyers out in force and as a corollary the attendant prices paid for the material continued the upward trend that the stamps of B. N. A. have been going through.

As was to be expected a good many members of the B.N.A.P.S. were in attendance, and some of the finest pieces that were offered for sale now grace the collections and stocks of some of our fellow members. Because the prices realized on the show pieces may be of interest to those who were unable to attend, I am listing below a few of the prices that a choice few of the Newfoundland items were sold for.

A truly superb used copy of #2 cataloguing \$350, realized \$410.

A block of 8 of the 3d Green on thick paper, Scott's #3, cataloguing \$80, brought \$110.

A superb used copy of the 4d Scarlet Vermilion, Scott's #4, catalogued at \$200 sold for \$245, and just as fine a copy on full cover brought the same price.

The bisected 8d Scarlet Vermilion, Scott's 8a, went comparatively cheaply

at \$275 and \$225 each as against a catalogue value of \$400.

A magnifient example of the 1sh Scarlet Vermilion, Scott's #9, with part o.g., which catalogues at \$1,000, brought \$810, while the same stamp bisected on part cover sold for \$310.

A superb used copy of the 1sh Orange Vermilion, Scott's #15, cataloguing

\$400, sold at \$535, well over full catalogue.

The first block of the 2d Rose, Scott's #17, in mint condition to appear on the New York market brought \$110 against a catalogue value of \$80. This despite the fact that the block was creased between the stamps in addition to being cut close at the top.

In the later issues a superb mint 10c Black on white paper, Scott's #27a,

brought \$8.50, or 50c more than the catalogue listing.

Two very fine copies of the 3c Vermilion, Scott's #33 with part gum brought \$14.50, and \$14 respectively against their \$13.50 evaluation in the catalogue.

The above items represent the highlights of the sale, and while the prices realized may seem high in proportion to the catalogue value, it is important to remember that the material in question was absolutely superb and sales with such material come along about once in five years. It wouldn't surprise me if five years from now many of the collectors will look back, and in retrospect will come to the conclusion that many of the items really sold at bargain prices.

TOPICS FOR WOUNDED VETS

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Article III-Membership

Any person, of good character, 21 years of age or over, who by their application bear witness to their interest in the fields of Philately to which this Society is devoted, may become a member. Any dealer shall be eligible for membership; but, he shall declare such professional status, and as such a professional, may not hold any of the elective offices within the Society.

The admission fee shall be one dollar. Dues shall be payable in advance.

The Society fiscal year shall begin January 1st.

Each applicant is required to furnish references (not a firm of which the proposer is a member) as to his character and financial responsibility, in addition to one member of the Society who acts as proposer.
