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CORKS, CORKS, AND MORE CORKS

The study of cork cancellers has commanded little interest among postal historians. Most cork markings are little more than blobs used to kill the stamp and, as such, are of little interest. Most of these corks had a short life, lasting from a few days to a few weeks. In a few cases the postmaster did some artwork on the cork and it is these fancy corks that are of interest to the postal historian.

The Barkerville star markings are good examples of these more unusual markings produced in British Columbia. In 1897/8, James Stone, the Barkerville postmaster, carved two (if not three) five pointed stars which were used briefly on mail.



The only extensive work on cork cancels in Canada was first published, in 1962, by K.M. Day and E.S. Smythies, <u>Canadian Fancy Cancellations</u> of the Nineteenth Century. During the 1940's, Gerald Wellburn made a listing of close to 40 corks used by the Victoria Post Office. The list was never published and exists only as "C-" numbers found on covers. A revised lists shows close to 60 corks used at Victoria.

SNELL BUBBLE JET CANCELLER

The new Snell Bubble Jet cancellation, introduced about January 1, at the Vancouver MPP has created a considerable amount of interest. The marking is produced by a Snell Packaging Systematic Solutions (SPSS) modular Bubble Jet Spray Printer (BJP) unit Model SCIS 7199. Similar equipment was introduced about a year ago in Ontario and attracted little interest there. The Vancouver BJP is located on the new Flat Sorting Machine (FSM) Number 619 (see Vol. 6 No.3 p.180) and is in use on OCR 140 only, and as a result it does not appear on all FSM mail.

According to post office authorities the unit has four Bubble Jet Spay Printers each containing 8 nozzles producing a total of 32 spray lines. Multiple jets are activated by a sensor that reads the height of the envelope as it enters the equipment faced and the stamp upward. It produces a two line (recently three line) spray, that in theory, cancells the stamp. The lowest nozzle is located 60 mm above the envelope track making it capable of cancelling a number 10 envelope. The top jet is located at 260 mm above the track. The bubble jet spray printers must be set at exactly 1 mm from the face of the envelope. The jets are subject to plugging with the result that spray lines are often missing and as a result cancellations showing all line are scarce. The use of the equipment is still in the experimental stage and the problem may be solved shortly.

Test "A" - date reads "56 10 00" and time shown as "A"

The experimental use of the JSP appears to have commenced on January 4 or 5, 1998, at which time the date read "561000" and the time was shown as "A". On January 5 the printer was programmed to produce the correct date followed by the numbers "1", "2" or "3" in place of the time. On January 6, the BJP went into full operation with the earliest recorded time being "16:50". Initially the second line read "SALV. ARMY/ARM. DU SALUT / / / / / " but on Jaunary 13 this was changed to read "POSTAL CODE/CODE POSTAL / / / / / ". Normally the machine number, the MPP postal Code, the date and the time appear on the top line with the slogan on the lower line but on January 8 the lines were briefly reversed. Other errors have also been reported. On February 3 a third line of slashes was added.

CARIBOO, B.C.

The establishment and location of the original Post Office opened in the present Barkerville area is one of confusion. A.S. Deaville's <u>The Colonial Postal System</u> ... is probably still the best source of information but in many ways it confuses the matter more than it assists in solving the problem. The following is based on Deaville's work with some reference to the postal records and the work done by George Melvin. The illustrations are from xerox copies of the Jim Pike collection which has now been dispursed.

In a letter dated May 1864, Governor Frederick Seymour appointed J.R. Commeline to be postmaster at Williams Creek at an annual salary of 400 pounds sterling. Commeline was responsible, under W.R.Spalding the Colonial Postmaster-General, for the postal services in the Cariboo district. At the same time the head office for Cariboo was removed from Williams Lake (not the present Williams Lake) to Williams Creek the centre of the Cariboo gold rush. Post offices were also eatablished within the Cariboo district at Clinton, Lake (Lac) La Hache, Soda Creek, Quesnelle Mouth (Quesnel), and Van Winkle in addition to the Cariboo head office located at Williams Creek. Despite the establishment of the six post offices the express companies still dominated the mail service and, although their charges were higher, they provided twice-a-week delivery as opposed to the three mails per month provided by the post office department. Naturally, complaints were widespread and to overcome the problem branch delivery offices were opened at Camerontown and Barkerville.

In May 1865, the government mail service was improved to weekly delivery and in July Commerline moved the Post Office from Williams Creek to Barkerville which was a few mile away along Williams Creek. In January 1886, Commeline's services were dispensed with and, in November, the mail service was reduced to once a month. The exact status of the Williams Creek post office becomes unclear but according to Deaville the office continued to be known as "Williams Creek" until July 1, 1872 when the name was changed to "Barkerville".

On July 20, 1871, British Columbia ceased to be a Crown Colony and the postal system was taken over by the Dominion Government. Officially a year later, July 1, 1872, the Barkerville Post Office was re-established with John Bowron as postmaster, with an annual salary of \$600. At no point does Deaville mention the existence of a post office under the name "Cariboo" and yet both Colonial and Dominion postal marking are known for an office of that name. A check of the records in Ottawa fails to produce any information, although the June 1872 <u>Post Office Gazetteer</u> lists Barkerville as being open but does not list the name "Cariboo".

A summary of the marking issued to the region do little to help solve the problem of "Cariboo". The colonial number ((10)) was issued to Willams Creek in July 1864 and remailed in use until after Confederation when it was used as a killer until at least May 1872. A colonial oval canceller date stamp reading "CARIBOO / * * B.C. * *" is known to have been used between between November 25, 1871 and April 8, 1872, while a split ring circular date stamp reading "CARIBOO / BRIT-COL" is reported in use between May 31, 1872 and September 7, 1872. The eariest "BARKERVILLE" cds is listed by Jim Pike as being dated January 2, 1875. The earliest proof date for Barkerville is October 8, 1879.

The express company markings provide no useful additional information. Gerald Wellburn in his study of the Barnard's Cariboo Express reported straight line markings from Barkerville, Richfield, Quesnelle, Lillooet, and Yale being used between 1884 and 1871.

SALMON ARM - I.P.S. MACHINE

Salmon Arm is the latest of the British Columbia Post Offices to be issued a new I.P.S. Rapid Cancelling Machines. Like most of the new machines it contains the Postal Code "VIE 1A0" rather than the post office name. Offices of this type usually process regional mail as well as local mail and usually have pairs of mail boxes, one for regional mail and one for out of region mail which will be sent to Vancouver MPP for processing. Machine cancellation of this type are rare outside the local region.

BARKERVILLE STARS - 1897-98

The 1897 Barkerville star cancellation is shown on the page 1 of this News Letter. The second and less well formed star is shown on the cover below. The first star appears to have been carved in the summer of 1897 and is found mainly on the Jubilee issue, while the second star was made the next spring and is usually found on the three cent Leaves issue. Other corks are known between 1893 and 1900. This months Response Form looks at the postal markings used at Barkerville prior to 1900.
