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ANOTHER WAH LEE COVER

Located 58 miles east of Quesnel, Barkerville is the only one of the early mining towns in the district to survive to the present. Its early stage growth was based on mining of placer gold by individuals or small groups of individuals. When the shallow surface deposits were all but mined out in the late 1870's, large companies came and mined the remaining gold with hydraulic methods. This lasted until about 1910. The third and last mining phase began when hardrock mining started in the early 30's and lasted until the mid 60's. Today Barkerville 's economy is based on tourism.

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Cover showing Barkerville Register with split-ring cancel dated March 10, 1905. 7 cent rate pays the 5 cent registration plus 2 cents surface letter rate.

DUNBAR HEIGHTS – MARINE HEIGHTS

There is much confusion over the location of post offices serving Dunbar Street in Vancouver. On April 1, 1914 two post offices namely, Dunbar Heights and Marine Height, were established to serve people living along the newly opened Dunbar Street car line. At the time the single track Dunbar street car line left 10th Avenue at Crown Street going south to 16th, turning east to Dunbar Street and then south on Dunbar to 41st Avenue where it ended.

The Dunbar Heights post office opened at 3704 16th Avenue just west of Dunbar Street with W.R. Williams as postmaster. It was relocated an number of times on 16th Avenue and finally closed January 31 1922 as the office was "no longer required". In 1927 Vancouver Sub 38 was established on Dunbar Street around the corner from the site of the original Dunbar Heights post office. Sub 38 closed briefly between 1962 and 1967 and in 2001 was upgraded to a Retail Postal Outlet located in the Dunbar Greetings shop as the Westside RPO located at 3458 Dunbar Street two blocks south of the original Dunbar Heights Post Office.

The Marine Heights post office presents more of a problem in that although the opening in April 1914 and closing in March 1918 are listed in the Post Office Transactions the office is not listed in the Canadian Official Guide for that period but is listed in the 1915 Henderson's Vancouver City Directory as being on Dunbar Street between 29th and 30th Avenues. The Marine Height post office closed under Postmaster General's Order 944, with the comment "no person willing". In March 1923 Vancouver Sub 24 was opened a block north of the site of of the former Marine Heights post office at 4426 Dunbar Street. In 1992 Sub 24 was upgraded and converted to a Franchise "A" under the name Dunbar Postal Outlet.

To further add to the confusion in 1926 Vancouver Sub 13 was opened at 5566 Dunbar Street at 41st Avenue. Sub 13 has been relocated on a number of occasions being on 41st Avenue on some occasions and on Dunbar Street at other times. In 1993 it was upgraded to a Gross Marketing Outlet and moved to the Stationary 2000 shop, its present location and in 1995 it was upgraded to a Postal Outlet and took the name of Southlands. PO. For political reasons the name was unacceptable and it was re-named Musqueam PO after the Musqueam Reserve located about a mile to the west.

There is some confusion over the exact closing date of the Marine Heights Post Office as no date is listed in the May 1918 Postal Guide but Vancouver record show it closed on April 30, 1918 as no person was willing to act as postmaster.

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B.C. ELECTRIC RAILWAY MAIL SERVICE

Prior to the completion of the C.P.R. to New Westminster in 1887 mail for settlements along the Lower Fraser River was transported by paddle wheel steamer or occasionally by stagecoach using the Yale road. Following the completion of the of the C.P.R. mail for the north side of the river was transported by railway mail car while the mail for the south side continued to be transported by riverboat. The completion of the Mission Bridge in 1891 and the Fraser River Bridge at New Westminster in 1904 made minor changes but it was not until the completion of the British Columbia Electric Railway from New Westminster to Chilliwack in 1910 that settlements of the south side if the Fraser River had a regular mail service. It should be noted that prior to 1910 the C.P.R. steamboat the *Beaver* and the Royal City Navigation Company Limited's the *Paystreak* provided limited service on alternate days from New Westminster to Chilliwack.

In the fall of 1910 the British Columbia Electric Railway was completed from New Westminster to Chilliwack and it was officially opened on October 2. In preparation for the obtaining of the mail contract the BCER had built two interurban cars with secure mail compartments (cars 1500 & 1501) and at the same time two almost identical cars (cars 1400 & 1401) with secure baggage compartments. The four cars are easily identifiable as there are two doors at the front, one for the motorman and the other serving the secure mail / baggage compartment. All four interurban cars were used to carry mail and were used in the Fraser Valley or on Lulu Island, and later in Victoria. The photo below shows a post office truck loading mail for Chilliwack into interurban car 1401 at the New Westminster on June 10, 1949

In 2006 Cec Coutts raised the question of the number of war time pictorial covers produced by Walter Purkis. Since then a considerable amount of new information has come to light and a number of new covers have been reported. The most interesting item is a four page vintage Xerox, probably produced in 1942, and showing over 80 wartime pictorial covers plus an equal number of US covers. No indication of the source of the list is provided but it appears to be part of an order sheet produced in the United States. It should be noted that none of the covers illustrated by Cec in the News Letter are illustrated on the sheets. (more covers will be illustrated in the next News Letter)
