


Jon Johnson - A Eureka Moment!!

Recently Jon Johnson spent some time researching the cover shown here. What had caught his eye was the "Posted / On Board / H.M. Transport" handstamp at



upper right, and the "No.1 Ship's Conducting Staffs / Embarkation Transit Unit" handstamp, dated 3

November 1942, on the reverse. Jon's extensive digging led him to find out that the cover had been mailed on board the RMS Queen Elizabeth, which left Halifax, NS as part of Convoy AT28 on 30 October 1942 and arrived at the port of Clyde, Scotland four days later. Convoy AT.28 comprised a single merchant ship, the Queen Elizabeth, and no escorts. She carried 11,000 troops on the voyage.





George Basher, January 28, 1947 – March 9 2020



Chris Hargreaves – Aero-philatelist

“As a boy I collected stamps, and wanted to become a pilot and travel the world. As I got older I stopped collecting stamps, gave up flying lessons due to chronic ear ache, and became a High School History teacher. However, because my parents collected stamps I sometimes visited stamp shops and shows to buy presents for them. My father collected birds on stamps, and one day I came across this cover with a bird in the cachet and a six cent airmail stamp selling for \$2.00. It intrigued me. I often taught my students about the 1930s. and remembered that at that time a quart of milk also cost six cents. But in 1992 (the time of this purchase) a quart of milk, (or its metric equivalent), cost \$2.25! So this cover that had once been a valued item, was prepared specially for a flight, sent to Edmonton, flown to Fort Nelson, travelled back across North America to Massachusetts, put in a



collection and now - fifty-five years later - was being sold for less, in purchasing power, than the original cost of the stamp!

“This 1937 First Flight cover sparked other interests – why were they created – who created them – what kind of aircraft carried them? I began reading about aviation history and First Flight Covers, and was soon collecting again, enthralled by aerophilately.”

Chris joined BNAPS in 1993 and has given presentations at several BNAPEXs, including “Air Mail Along the St. Lawrence” at BNAPEX 2009 in Kingston; and on “Gerhard Zucker’s Project for Rocket Mail over


Niagara Falls, 1936” at BNAPEX 2015 in St. Catharines. In 2015 Chris received the BNAPS Vincent G Greene Award for the Best Article in *BNA Topics*, on research into the "D.w." handstamp.



Chris is editor of *The Canadian Aerophilatelist*, journal of The Canadian Aerophilatelic Society; and also writes a quarterly column of "Canadian Air Mail Notes" for the *Air Post Journal*, monthly journal of The American Air Mail Society. He received the L.B. Gatchell Literature Award from the AAMS for the best article in the *Air Post Journal* in 2014, and again in 2016. Chris is also Editor-in-chief for the revised edition of *The Air Mails of Canada and Newfoundland*, which will be part of the 7th Edition of The American Air Mail Catalogue being published by the AAMS, and RPSC representative to the F.I.P. Aerophilatelic Commission. In 2015 he was inducted into the Aerophilatelic Hall of Fame.

Outside of philately, Chris is Chair of the Kingston Field Naturalists’ Conservation Committee, and a member of the Ontario Invasive Plant Council’s Research and Control Committee.
