CANADIAN BASE AND FIELD POST OFFICES IN ENGLAND IN THE GREAT WAR--By Wayne Schnarr

The sharing of APO and FPO postal hammers in France and Belgium during the First World War by the British, Canadian, ANZAC, and American forces has been well studied and documented [1,2]. Canadian troops also sent mail from numerous campe, depots, and hospitals in England. Some of these facilities were used exclusively by Canadian troops during certain periods while others were shared. While doing research for Volume I of the BNAPS Catalogue of Canadian Military Mail Markings, I did not find any comprehensive documentation on Canadian postal operations in England.

The key questions for each location is whether there were periods when the hammer for a specific camp was exclusively used by Canadian mail clerks [author's italics.Ed.]

The table outlines information from various sources on the opening and closing of the CPC base and field post offices at camps in England. The CPC units with the Canadian troops on Salisbury Plain in 1914/1915 used the large COEF hammers but mail to Canada during this period was often sent through local civilian or nearby British military camp post offices. The use of specific camp hammers by the CPC started in March 1915 with the establishment of the first base post office at Shorncliffe and ended when the last repatriation camp closed in 1919.

However, the Canadian postal operations in England were much larger as one reference states that"...the CPC also operated the mail detachments of nineteen Regimental Depots, three Command Depots, one Discharge Depot and six Discharging Hospitals", I have not found a list of these additional 29 mail detachments.

1914	Fall	Canadian troops were bivouacked on Salisbury Plain, primarily at Bustard Camp, West Down South Camp, West Down North Camp, Pond Farm Camp and Sling Camp
1915	March/April	Canadian units comprising the First Division moved from Salisbury Plain to Shorncliffe
	15 March	The first Canadian Base Post Office was operational at Shorncliffe
	May/June	Three Field Post Offices (FPOs) were established at Dibgate, Otterpool and West Sandling (an East Sandling Camp is mentioned but only Sandling markings are seen)
	October	A second Base Post Office was established at Bramshott to handle mail from Bramshott, Bordon and Longmoor camps

A search of the War Diaries revealed the following Regimental Depots in England. The number of records and the periods covered by the War Diaries varies widely but nearly all end in 1919 with demobilization and repatriation. The only camp from this list which did not have a base or field post office is Shoreham. The individual depots would often have orderly room handstamps but very few of these had specific mail or postal wording.

- --Canadian Artillery (Witley, then Ripon)
- --Canadian Cavalry (Kinmel Park)
- --Canadian Engineers (Seaford, Witley)
- --Canadian Railway Troop
- --Nova Scotia (Bramshott, Ripon)
- --New Brunswick (Shoreham, Bramshott, Witley, Ripon)
- --1st Quebec (Shoreham, Bramshott, Ripon)
- --2nd Quebec (Shoreham, Witley)
- --Eastern Ontario (Seaford, Witley)

- --1st Central Ontario (West Sandling, Shorncliffe, Witley, Ripon)
- -- 2nd Central Ontario (East Sandling, Shorncliffe, Witley, Ripon)
- --Western Ontario (Bramshott, Witley, Ripon)
- --Manitoba (Dibgate, Shorncliffe, Seaford)
- --Saskatchewan (Bramshott) | Parabasa wadao ban aradasa DaMAD os abasat
- -- Alberta (Bramshott, Ripon)
- --British Columbia (Seaford)

The three **Command Depots** were intended for physical and military skills training to prepare soldiers for further service. Each depot could handle up to 5,000 soldiers.

- --No.1 at Hastings for Shorncliffe-area troops
- --No.2 at Bramshott for Aldershot-area troops
- -- No.3 at Seaford for troops in other parts of England

No.1 Canadian Discharge Depot (CDD) was at Buxton, which was also the location of Granville Canadian Special Hospital, Canadian Red Cross Special Hospital and Canadian Nurses Convalescent Hospital. The CDD was a hospital and started to receive Canadian soldiers in December 1916 who were to be sent back to Canada (soldiers returning to France went to Epsom in Surrey). In January 1919, the mandate of the depot changed to handle only married men and dependents going to Canada. There were post office staff at the CDD.

An extensive literature search has not turned up any reference to Canadian Discharging Hospitals. The Canadian hospitals were categorized as Stationary, General, Special, or Convalescent. The Stationary Hospitals were regularly moving, usually into active battle areas. General Hospitals No.1 through No.8 were also quite mobile and No.9 through No.16 were not formed until September or October 1917. The Special Hospitals were generally smaller and do not fit the "Discharging" description. The only six hospitals which fit the "Discharging" description are the Convalescent Hospitals' (excluding the two Red Cross Convalescent Hospitals, King's and Princess Patricia's):

- --Woodcote Park Convalescent Hospital (Epsom; Sep.5, 1915 to Jun.30, 1919)
- --Bear Wood Convalescent Hospital (Wokingham; Sep.20, 1915 to Jul.24, 1919)
- --Bromley Convalescent Hospital (Bromley; Apr.20, 1915 to Aug.31, 1918)
- --Hillingdon House, Canadian Convalescent Hospital (Uxbridge; Sep.20, 1915 to Dec.12, 1917)
- --Monks Horton Convalescent Hospital (Monks Horton; May 1, 1915 to Aug.28, 1918--closed for five months in 1916)
- --Officers' Convalescent Hospital (Matlock, Bath; Mar.5, 1918 to Sep.12, 1919)

In addition to providing this summary of CPC operations in England during the Great War (excluding the London/Record Office), I am also looking for additional information and postal markings from these camps, depots, and hospitals. There are some U.K. publications which I have not been able to access [3,4,5].



adian personnel of No.9 Stationary Hospital. At the time of this real





photo postcard, April 11, 1918, No.12 Canadian General Hospital personnel took over duties when it was organized on October 12, 1917. This term extended to September 23, 1919. The BRAMSHOTT CAMP.B.O/+ was a Branch Office used from 1914-1918.

[Ron sent along this extremely well-done memorial card for Lt. Lawrence Lavell (E.H. Wigney's <u>C.E.F. Roll of Honour</u>, 1996 indicates "Lowell") Davidson who was gassed at Passchendaele on November 11, 1917 and sadly died in No.14 General Hospital on November 25, 1917. He was 21 and had served with the 5th Canadian Infantry Battalion (Western Cavalry). He was buried in the Wimereux Communal Cemetery, France.Ed.]

CMMSG AT ORAPEX 2018 MAY 5, 1400-1500



Canadian Military Mail Study Group meeting to be held at ORAPEX 2018: ORAPEX, the annual national-level exhibition and bourse held each spring in Ottawa, is managed by volunteers drawn from the RA Stamp Club, the Amicale des philatélistes de l'Outaouais, the Ottawa Philatelic Society and related philatelic societies and organizations. The show is held at the RA Centre, the recreation and activity centre located at 2451 Riverside Drive in central Ottawa operated by the Recreation Association of the Public Service of Canada.

ORAPEX 2018, being held May 5 – 6, will mark the 57th edition of the show. The 2018 show theme is Canadian Military Mail, and the Canadian Military Mail Study Group (CMMSG) has been invited to hold a seminar during the show. NEW REPORTS, SECOND WORLD WAR--By John Watson


[John has sent along some new or unlisted reports. "FIELD POST OFFICE" is printed in full rather than just "FPO" in the HC1 device. John notes that this is a nice FECB registered usage as well.

The following shows the back of a cover which has two unreported items. Firstly the circular BASE ARMY POST OFFICE/DIRECTORY SERVICE, which is identical wording to Sayles #F28, but measures 30mm instead of 33mm. In addition the internal lettering is smaller than #F28 (2mm instead of 3mm). I presume that this would be regarded as a second hammer for #F28.



Secondly, the label is similar to Sayles #F290 but worded very differently, even before the manuscript modification.

The front of the cover, which is fairly unremarkable, does have Sayles [Cont'd.]

OCTOBER 1944 "SOMEWHERE IN BELGIUM" POSTAL NEWS--By Mike Street

On October 17, 1944 Corporal Gordon D. Frankum used a piece of Canadian Legion War Services stationery and envelope to write to his mother in the Notre Dame de Grace neighbourhood of Montreal from "Somewhere in Belgium". Most of the letter concerned mail delivery to the front. It was endorsed "CAO" (Canadian Army Overseas). There is no Field Post Office mark, but a 36mm diameter circular *RELEASED BY*/BASE CENSOR mark was added in blue ink on the front.

"Dear Mother,

I am working this afternoon but as we are not very busy I am doing a little letter writing in between times. Have not received your parcel as yet but the Post Office has been moving its location and that naturally causes some delay and confusion which will take a while to straighten out. The Post Office, on the whole, have done and excellent job so far, and I imagine things will improve steadily. I am receiving your letters in from 4 to 8 days. Regular mail seems to be as fast as air mail but I can't tell for sure as sometimes our mail is held up for several days between the post office and us and we get a lot at once instead of a little each day. It means longer to wait but is necessary as we can't send DR's [abbreviation uncertain but likely 'Dispatch Riders'] out to everyone every day. Considering the tremendous undertaking the handling of mail is, we really do OK".


The letter goes on to describe the new artillery shells the Germans Cec to report it or couffrm the date.Ed.

were using:

"[The shells] make a very big bang but don't appear to do much damage. The worst part of it is they are noiseless on approach and give you quite a sudden start when they hit. None of them have come near us so far and they are not used at night so we don't mind them very much."


The letter ends, "Well I really have no news so until next time take care of yourself. Love to all at home./Gordon".



CAPO 5050 LAST DAY--By Cec Coutts (Non-member)



It received a Pilot Mound, Manitoba backstamp with an unclear March or May 17, 1941 date. The Grenadiers arrived on June 20, 1940 and left Jamaica on September 13, 1941. The MILITARY CENSOR/Y/FORCE/NO.4 "serrated" censor mark is in carmine. [Apologies if this is a repeat.Ed.]
