
The next edition of the R.P.O. Handbook was discussed - possibly in another few years because of the large volume of additions and changes being reported.

Lew's planned publication on the Newfoundland and Maritimes hammer analysis, etc. was discussed, and the possibility of using the computer system of dating strikes Year-Month-Day rather than the Month-Day-Year system now used will be explored.

During the Seminar portion of the meeting, Palmer Moffat gave an excellent history of the Newfoundland Railway, including dates and maps. John McCrea showed slides of interesting items from his collection - including cross-border mail, and Jack Wallace described the varied history of railways in British Columbia. We hope to publish at least parts of their hand-outs during the year.

## FROM THE MEMBERSHIP

Lionel Gillam - writes regarding the supposed correction of "G.J.& M." on page 9 of the last issue. One error seems to lead to another - I should have amended both parts of the listing to read - Garneau Junction & Montreal. My error, Lionel, and your reputation is secure. Jim Lehr advises that he is starting on a study of the Prince Edward Island Railway and would appreciate any data from the membership. Warren Bosch writes regarding the recording and publishing of exact early and late dates rather than just the year. Lew advises that he records these, but that the volume of changes in each Annex would just be too large to publish. Ed. Maloney has sent some interesting facing slips which I hope to publish soon, and also an interesting notice regarding entry to mail cars (bilingual). Peter McCarthy is a C.N.R. Trainman running on the Island Fond line. He has offered to write us a story on the scenery, etc. along the line, and I look forward to receiving it for publication. Jim Miller specializes in the Kamloops and Rogers Pass areas of British Columbia, and has sent the two pages in this issue showing the C.P.R. in Kamloops, and the earlier Craigellachie commemorative covers (50th Anniversary). I have an example of the top cover, and also the one shown below. Does anyone know of any other types?
Jim Karr has recently sent Whit Bradley listings of his R.P.O.markings on Map stamp. Does anyone else have any to report ? Dave also sent lists of airmails and Special Deliveries which will be printed soon.



Jim Miller also writes concerning the large number of double-ring oval rubber stamps inscribed "SUPT. RAILWAY MAIL SERVICE / (City)" which are shown in the proof books from about 1910 to 1932. Should these be listed? Lew's position on these is that they are office stamps used to date receipt or despatch of mail. If and when we find them used on a cover, they will be listed - but showing them as "Only Proof Known" would merely clutter up the handbook to little advantage. The same comment applies to the many Type 5 markings for numerous runs which were proofed during the same general period.

# Please Mr. Postman help save the sailor

MONTREAL — The Seafarers' International Union of Canada is fighting to get mail service restored to some 10,000 sailors on the Great Lakes, left high and dry when the last marine post office on the lakes failed to reopen this spring.

"There was one post office to serve the entire Great Lakes region and now they've closed it," said Andrew Boyle, the union's executive vice-president. "Now a guy can't even get a letter from home."

The marine post office in Thorold, Ont., was one of several built along the St. Lawrence Seaway about a generation ago. Over the years traffic in the seaway has declined and the Thorold marine post office was the last one to close.

Canada Post spokesman Tom Dalby said the Thorold office handled 31,000 letters last shipping season — up to 125 a day.

He said Canada Post closed the office as a cost-cutting measure. It will save \$48,000, mainly accounted for by the salaries of the four part-time workers who staffed it.

Dalby said that seamen can still get mail through shipping company offices, and many of them were getting their correspondence that way even before the office closed.

But that's not good enough, says veteran seaman Dick Thomasson, who is leading the union's campaign to reopen the Canada Post branch at Thoroid on Lock 5 of the Welland Canal.

"We've had situations when mail has been in company offices two or three months and nobody bothered to deliver it. They're not obliged to do it and it's not something you can depend on."

Said Thomasson: "There's nothing more important to a sailor than a letter."

Garry Gribble, personnel manager for Algoma Central Railway, which operates a fleet on the lakes, said he sympathizes with the sailors:


"We do deliver the mail, but they can't mail stuff now. And these guys move around a lot. They may be with one company this month and another company the next, and we don't even know where they are."

Sailors can still use ship-te-shore radio, but Thomasson says that is expensive, there is no privacy, and the service is intended for business or for emergencies.

"I speak first-hand," he said. "I spent 20 years on the boats. You can read a letter over and over again, and I've seen it many times.


"A guy that you can't normally get out of bed with a crowbar is up at mail call because he wants to know if he's going to get pictures of the new baby, or a letter from his girlfriend."

Thomasson said a petition with 6,000 names has been sent to Ottawa, a demonstration was held at Thorold, letters have been written to Prime Minister Brian Mulroney and Michel Cote, the minister responsible for Canada Post, but there had been no hint the decision may be reconsidered.




A Great Lakes freighter: no mail stops

#### C. P. R. Station, Kamloops, B. C.



The above card shows the train standing in the station, around 1920, and if you look closely, you can see a person standing on the platform handing a letter to the clerk in the mail car.

In the card below, the mainline of the C.P.R. ran down the main street of Kamloops until 1914. Kamloops was one of the very few towns that existed along the C.P.R. route prior to the construction of the railroad in the west. Due to the large river and rugged terrain around the city centre, there was nowhere else they could put the tracks. Notice the post office, first building on the right.
