# A short synopsis of Semi-Official Airmail Service by B.C. Airways Limited

British Columbia Airways Limited began operations in 1928 out of the Lansdowne airfield in Victoria, B.C. offering air travel from B.C.'s capital to Vancouver and Seattle. Formed by the Eve brothers of Victoria, the airline operated using just one aircraft, a Ford 4-AT-B Tri-motor built by the Stout Metal Airplane Company of Dearborn, Michigan. The plane arrived in Victoria on July 23, 1928 and the company began carrying passengers later that day.

In addition to passengers, B.C. Airways sought post office approval to issue its own airmail stamp and carry mail between Victoria and Vancouver and they carried some 396 first flight covers on their July 23<sup>rd</sup> flight from Victoria to demonstrate the feasibility of doing so. Shortly thereafter the airline received approval to carry airmail and to issue its own semi-official airmail stamp to as a fee for conveying mail. B.C. Airways quickly produced a blue five cent airmail stamp and these were to be applied to the back of letters at one stamp per ounce of mail carried. Regular government postage was, of course, also required to be paid in addition to the semi-official stamp.

On August 3, 1928 the airline conducted its first regular flight with mail franked with its stamps and some 496 covers are reported as having been carried. Sadly, the company's semi-official airmail service lasted for just 23 days, when the operation tragically ended with the crash of the company's only aircraft on August 25, 1928 in the Strait of Juan de Fuca near Port Townsend, Washington. Given their short life span, examples of mail carried by the airline other than on its August 3<sup>rd</sup> first flight are very difficult to find.



Above is an example of mail carried by the airline on August 8<sup>th</sup>, five days after service began. Note that the cover was two ounces, requiring both double the airmail fee and double the regular postage. As this cover illustrates, although semi-official airmail stamps were supposed to be place on the back it would seem that the post office did not rigidly enforce this requirement.



Mailed on August  $11^{th}$  at 4:00 p.m. the above cover illustrates mail carried from Vancouver to Victoria and nicely illustrates the expediency that the airmail service provided as it bears a receiving cancel in Victoria just one hour later!



Mailed on August 25, this cover captures the sudden demise of B.C. Airways. The sender of this cover could not have known of the airline's fate and posted it with the intention of having it quickly delivered using both special delivery and airmail service. However, it was on this day at about 10:00 a.m. that the company's only aircraft crashed with all on board killed. With the loss of their only aircraft and principle air crew, the airline never again flew, bringing an end to this interesting yet short-live airmail service in British Columbia.

### ALL NATIONS AUCTION SUCCESS

The March 12<sup>th</sup> auction from All Nations was a huge success according to regional group member, Brian Grant Duff. The highlight was a letter signed by John Gassy Jack Deighton, March 11<sup>th</sup>, 1875. Part of the Wellburn Collection being auctioned by All Nations. It had been estimated to sell for \$2000 and actually realized \$44,000. Another Wellburn item, Wells Fargo 1868 realized \$1705.00. A Newfoundland reprint proof set of 10 realized \$1485 from an estimate of \$100. Cape of Good Hope #10 on piece went for \$2090 from an estimate of \$500.

On the coin side, Canada uncirculated 1948 Voyageur silver dollar went for \$1320 from an estimate of \$1000.

Hudson's Bay Company uncirculated 1820 5 shillings estimated at \$500 realized \$1597 and Hudson's Bay 25 c card money estimated at \$500 realized \$1375.

Art Ross and Lester Patrick early 1900 hockey cards also went for well over the estimate.







Registered 1½ ounce triple rate cover posted at VANCOUVER on November 20, 1906 and addressed to MITCHAM England. Routed via MONTREAL on November 26th and sent to the MONTREAL Dead Letter Office for Customs inspection. Re-posted the next day with three rare #OX2 Official Seals tied by MONTREAL-BRANCH-DLO double oval handstamps. Also note a Montreal DLO wax seal on back and MITCHAM arrival backstamp on December 8th. The only reported cover with three #OX2 Official Seals.
